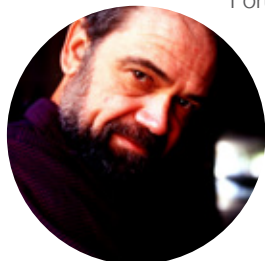

Tim Low

Tim Low is a biologist, environmental consultant and prize-winning best-selling author of six books about nature and conservation. His book *Feral Future* inspired the formation of an NGO, the Invasive Species Council, which Tim represented at the 18th Global Biodiversity



Forum in Mexico. He has served on the

Australian environment minister's advisory committee, wrote a column for *Nature Australia* magazine for 20 years, co-edits *Wildlife Australia* magazine, and helps run the Christmas Island Bird'n'Nature Week each year. As a sole consultant he has developed

policies to protect biodiversity from climate change and invasive species for clients including the Australian and Queensland governments. He has wide field skills in botany and zoology, having discovered several new lizard species, one of which he named. In 2012 he undertook a Churchill Fellowship to investigate climate change in the Northern Hemisphere. He has nearly completed a book about birds.

Professor Tim Smith

Professor Tim Smith PhD is the inaugural Director of the Sustainability Research Centre at the University of the Sunshine Coast (USC), which is one of three flagship research concentrations of the university,

comprised of over 60 researchers.

Prior to his appointment with USC, Prof Smith was a senior research scientist with the CSIRO.

Prof Smith has also led the social science research and education portfolios of two national research centres, the Coastal Cooperative Research Centre and the Catchment Hydrology Cooperative Research Centre.



Apart from several academic appointments, Prof Smith has also worked in local and state government, and in private industry. He has undertaken projects for national and international organisations such as the ARC, CSIRO, Land and Water Australia, five CRCs, AusAID, GIZ, and UNDP. Prof Smith recently led the Adaptive Learning Theme of the CSIRO Coastal Collaboration Cluster, the Adaptive Capacity Theme of the South East Queensland Climate Adaptation Research Initiative, and the Communities Theme of the Marine Biodiversity and Resources Adaptation Network. Along with his research partners, he was awarded the 2009 Australian Museum Eureka Prize for Innovative Solutions to Climate Change. His research interests focus on the relationships between people, place and change.

KEYNOTE

Dr Mark Stafford Smith

Dr Mark Stafford Smith has worked on the impacts of climate variability in desert areas around the world since 1975, and is now playing a key role in the CSIRO Climate Adaptation National Research Flagship. Mark is the Science Director of the Climate Adaptation Flagship. He monitors

the science being undertaken across the Flagship research themes, helping to ensure that the Flagship produces more than the sum of its parts.



Mark works with research theme leaders and external research partners to deliver strategies and tools that will allow Australia to minimise the risks and

maximise the opportunities resulting from climate change. He continues a small amount of activity on the science of desert living and sustainable management of outback environments.

Gail Hochachka

Gail Hochachka, BSc MA works in international sustainable development using integral principles as a Co-Director of the global network Integral Without Borders and as the Integral Program Coordinator with the non-profit organisations One Sky-The Canadian Institute for Sustainable Living. Her focus is on the need for greater synthesis and integration between disciplines in this field, particularly between social change theory, systems theory, and consciousness studies.

Gail has carried out action research and been involved in projects towards this integration in rainforest conservation, capacity building, leadership development, climate change adaptation, and community resilience in different countries of Latin



America and Africa. She's a published author including the book, *Developing Sustainability, Developing the Self: An Integral Approach to International and Community Development*, as well as several articles in *Ecological Applications*, *World Futures Journal*, and the *Journal of Integral Theory and Practice*.

Tim Winton

Tim's background is in the sustainability sector. Over the last 20 years he has worked in sustainability in various capacities: as a hands-on contractor within the reforestation industry, organic farmer, not-for-profit founder, company director, educator, designer and consultant. He developed PatternDynamics™ as a method of understanding natural systems and for leveraging those understandings in managing complexity. Translating natural patterns into sustainability tools is his life's work and overriding passion.

Tim is an independent Integral scholar-practitioner who has published articles in the Journal of Integral Theory and Practice, as part of the proceedings of Integral Academic Conferences and Practitioner Seminars and as a contributor to the edited volume, Integral Theory in Action: Applied, Theoretical, and Critical Perspectives on the AQAL Model (in press). Tim speaks and writes regularly on sustainability topics. Tim holds a BA in English Literature, a Diploma of Permaculture Design and a Certificate 4 in Workplace Training and Assessment.



Senator Larissa Waters

Larissa Waters is the first Australian Greens Senator for Queensland. She took office in July 2011 and is the national spokesperson on Environment, Biodiversity and Natural Heritage; Mining and Coal Seam Gas; Cape York, Great Barrier Reef and Coral Sea; World Heritage and Population. Senator Waters is an environmental lawyer who worked in the community sector for 8 years advising people how to use the law to protect the environment. In 2011 she was named Australian Young Environmental Lawyer of the Year 2010 by the Law Council of Australia.

She is passionate about protecting our environment and public participation and accountability in government. In the Senate she will move amendments to federal laws to better protect the Great Barrier Reef, promote renewable energy, and protect good quality agricultural land from incompatible land uses.

John Cook

John Cook is the Climate Communication Fellow for the Global Change Institute at the University of Queensland. He created SkepticalScience.com, a website that rebuts climate misinformation with peer-reviewed science. In 2011, Skeptical Science won the Australian Museum Eureka Prize for the Advancement of Climate Change Knowledge. John has co-authored the college textbook Climate Change Science: A Modern Synthesis, the book Climate Change Denial: Heads in the Sand and published several papers on climate change and the psychology of misinformation.



Kira Husher

Kira Husher is Community Conservation Manager at Sydney's Taronga Zoo. She is responsible for the management, strategic development and delivery of Taronga's conservation campaigns. These campaigns aim to leverage the Zoo brand and visitor experience to empower the community to take focused, practical action for wildlife conservation.

Kira is a Science Communicator with a passion for environmental conservation and impact evaluation. Her career vision is to empower and equip individuals, businesses and policy makers as environmental custodians through compelling, creative and measurable approaches. Her aim is to promote inclusive, collaborative and long term solutions towards modern conservation to ensure a thriving future for both wildlife and people.
