

#### Keynote speakers



**Bob Brown** 

Founder of the Bob Brown Foundation, previous leader of the Greens and former Senator, Author, Photographer

Bob Brown was elected to the Senate in 1996, after ten years as an MHA in Tasmania's state parliament.

In his first speech in the Senate, Bob raised the threat posed by climate change. Government and opposition members laughed at his warning of sea level rises and it has taken ten years for them to finally begin to acknowledge the causes and effects of climate change.

Since 1996, Bob has continued to take a courageous, and often politically lonely, stand on issues across the national and international spectrum. Some of the many issues that Bob has raised in the Senate include petrol sniffing in Central Australia, self-determination for West Papua and Tibet, saving Tasmania's ancient forests, opposing the war in Iraq, justice for David Hicks, stopping the sale of the Snowy Hydro scheme and opposing the dumping of nuclear waste in Australia

Bob was re-elected to the Senate in 2001. Following the election of four Greens senators in 2004, Bob became parliamentary leader of the Australian Greens in 2005.

The 2007 election saw Bob re-elected to the Senate for a third term along with two new Greens Senators in WA and SA

In 2010 Bob led the Australian Greens to a historic result with more than 1.6 million Australians voting for the Greens and the election of nine Senators and one House of Representatives member. As a result of this election the Greens gained balance of power in the Senate and signed an agreement with the ALP which allowed Prime Minister Julia Gillard to form government. A key part of this agreement was the Greens requirement that a price on carbon be introduced, which led to legislation being passed at the end of 2011.

Bob stepped down as Leader of the Australian Greens, and then retired from the Senate in June 2012.



**Brendan Trembath** 

#### Senior Reporter, ABC

Brendan Trembath has more than two decades experience in radio and television, including reporting from the White House in Washington, warships in the Pacific and tiny Aboriginal communities in regional Australia.

He is currently a senior reporter for the national radio programs AM, PM and The World Today. Brendan was on the spot during the 2014 Lindt Cafe siege, the 2013 Blue Mountains bushfires and the 2011 Queensland floods.

From 1997 to 2005 Brendan was a reporter and anchor for the business network Bloomberg Television in Tokyo and Sydney.

Brendan's first major media role was with ABC Radio News, which he joined fresh out of university in 1990. During this time he covered the long running trial of the backpacker killer Ivan Milat.



Peter Cochrane

Director NFPs, consultant, advisor, candidate for IUCN Council

Peter has over twenty years experience in senior executive leadership and governance roles in the public and private sectors. He consults on environment and sustainability issues, and is an adviser for the national State of Environment Report 2016 focused on building its audience and utility, and its potential form post 2016

He chairs the Steering Committee of the National Environmental Science Program's Marine Biodiversity Hub and is an Adjunct Fellow at the Fenner School of Environment and Society at ANII

He is a Director of Ecotourism Australia, the Blue Mountains World Heritage Institute and Tangaroa Blue Foundation. He sits on the Steering Group of the Protected Area Learning and Research Collaboration.

He is an associate with two consulting companies: Futureye and Empowering Engagements. Peter was Director of National Parks and head of Parks Australia from 1999-2013.

Peter is also a member of the IUCN World Commission on Protected Areas Executive and Steering Committees, and a candidate for the next IUCN Council as a regional Councillor for Oceania.



#### Associate Professor Ralph Chapman

Ralph is an economist who has worked in government, consulting, and the academy. Having helped negotiate the Kyoto Protocol in another life, his interests have turned to practical ways of doing something about climate change – that is, mitigation policies in transport, energy, housing and cities.

He teaches at Victoria University of Wellington, where he heads the Environmental Studies program. He is also a co-director of the NZ Centre for Sustainable Cities, an urban research network. In August, he is book about climate change policy, Time of Useful Consciousness, was published by Bridget Williams Books.

Late last year, a 'housing and health' research team, of which he is a member, received the Prime Minister's Science Prize for 2014.



#### The Honourable Penelope Wensley AC, HFEIANZ

Chair of Reef 2050 and Honorary Fellow of EIANZ

Penelope Wensley was born in Toowoomba and completed a Bachelor of Arts degree with First Class Honours at the University of Queensland in 1967.

In 1968, Ms Wensley joined the Australian Foreign service and pursued a highly distinguished career as a diplomat, representing Australia in a wide range of overseas posts and senior policy positions until 2008, when she became Queensland's twenty-fifth Governor.

Among her prestigious diplomatic appointments, she served as Australia's Ambassador to the United Nations for seven years, in both Geneva and New York, as Ambassador for the Environment, High Commissioner to India and Ambassador to France. She has been awarded honorary Doctorates by The University of Queensland, Griffith University and the Queensland University of Technology.

In 1994. The University of Queensland named her as the first woman Alumnus of the year. In 2001, Penelope was made an Officer of the Order of Australia (AO), for her distinguished contributions to Australia's international relations. On Australia Day 2011 she was appointed a Companion (AC) in the General Division of the Order of Australia "For eminent contribution to the people of Queensland, and to Australia's international relations through senior diplomatic representational roles and as a key contributor to initiatives of the United Nations"



David Parker MP

Spokesperson for the Environment, Water, Regulatory Reform, State Owned Enterprises, ICT, and Entrepreneurship Shadow Attorney General

David Parker had a long career in business and law before being elected to Parliament as Labour MP in the normally safe National seat of Otago in 2002.

He has been involved in many businesses, including innovative bio-tech export start-ups A2 Corporation, BLIS Technologies, Botryzen and Pharmazen, as well as in more traditional industries. He is an experienced CEO and company director.

David was appointed to Cabinet in 2005, and served as Minister of Energy, Climate Change, Transport, State Services, Attorney-General, and Land Information under the Helen Clark Government.

In opposition David Parker has served as Deputy Leader, Shadow Attorney General, and in Finance, Economic Development and various other roles.

David wants Labour to rally New Zealand behind a central goal of delivering prosperity and fairer economic outcomes for New Zealanders. A fair go and a fair share. This requires lifting exports, more productive investment and discouraging speculation. He wants the benefits of economic growth to be fairly shared so as to prevent extremes of rich and poor becoming entrenched in New Zealand, and to fund essential services for the community.

David is an avid tramper and is also dedicated to lifting New Zealand's environmental performance. In 2008 he was named by the Listener magazine as environmentalist of the year for his work as Minister of Energy and Climate Change.

He also features in the most-viewed Parliamentary question ever – a humorous exchange with Gerry Brownlee on going tramping in conservation areas then threatened with mining.

#### Field trip one | Brisbane Airport Corporation and Port of Brisbane tour

You will be collected from the conference venue, the Sofitel and taken to the Port of Brisbane for a guided tour of this fascinating area. Lunch will be provided at the quirky Observation Cafe at the Port of Brisbane which provides panoramic views of the bay and its islands. After lunch we will venture to the Brisbane Airport Corporation. The new parallel runway will be 3.3km long, 60m wide, located 2km west of and parallel to the existing runway. After a picturesque morning tea at the Dam wall, you will visit erosion and restoration sites around Wivenhoe Dam. Lunch will be in the heritage town of Esk in the Upper Brisbane Valley which is renowned for its beautiful lakes and dams. After lunch you will head to the Wivenhoe pocket and mid Brisbane catchment where you will see water quality testing and channel restoration. Our final leg of the field trip will be travelling to the lower Brisbane River to see a great example of water sensitive urban design.
