



Steven Carden

Steven Carden is the CEO of New Zealand's largest farming company, Pāmu Farms of NZ (Landcorp). He chairs MPI's Primary Industry Chief Executive's Forum on Animal Welfare, and is a director of Spring Sheep Milk Company, Milk New Zealand and the Agriculture Leaders' Health and Safety Action Group. Prior to becoming CEO of Landcorp in August 2013, Steven was General Manager of Australia's largest pasture seed company, PGG Wrightson Seeds. Before that he worked at McKinsey & Company, the global management consulting firm, in New York and Auckland.

He is the founder of the First Foundation in 1998, a program that helps talented but financially disadvantaged secondary school students successfully complete university through workplace scholarships. He is the author of "NZ Unleashed", published by Random House in 2007. He holds an LLB and BA from Auckland University, and an MBA from Harvard Business School.



Simon Upton

Until recently, Simon Upton has been the Environment Director at the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD). From October this year he will take on the role of New Zealand's Parliamentary Commissioner for the Environment.

Simon is a former New Zealand parliamentarian whose political career between 1981 and 2000, included nine years as a Minister. His portfolios included Environment, Research, Biosecurity, Health and State Services.

As Environment Minister he chaired the 7th Session of the UN Commission on Sustainable Development and the 1998 meeting of OECD Environment Ministers.

Between his retirement from political life in 2000 and taking up his present role at the OECD, Simon combined his chairmanship of the Round Table on Sustainable Development at the OECD with a variety or private sector roles in New Zealand.

He is a member of the China Council for International Cooperation on Environment & Development, a Fellow of the Royal New Zealand Society and a Rhodes Scholar with degrees in English literature, music and law from the University of Auckland and an MLitt in political philosophy from Oxford University.



Distinguished Professor Dame Anne Salmond

Anne Salmond is a Distinguished Professor in Maori Studies and Anthropology at the University of Auckland. In 2013 she won the Rutherford Medal. New Zealand's top scientific award, and became the New Zealander of the Year.

She is a Foreign Associate of the National Academy of Sciences in the US, Corresponding Fellow of the British Academy, and Foreign Member of the American Philosophical Society. As part of her scholarly work, Dame Anne has developed a strong interest in Enlightenment natural history and Maori and Pacific philosophies relating to land and sea, bringing these together with aspects of cutting edge science to reflect upon environmental questions.

Dame Anne has a long-standing practical interest in environmental projects. A former Deputy Chair of the Parks and Wilderness Trust in Auckland, she is Patron of the Whinray Kiwi Trust, the National Whale Museum, the Great Barrier Island Trust, the Te Awaroa Foundation for rivers restoration, Chairperson of the Longbush Eco Trust and co-founder of the Longbush Ecosanctuary in Gisborne.



Future Crunch

Future Crunch are part of a global movement of scientists, technologists, hackers and creatives that think there are new and better ways of doing things in the 21st century. Their expertise ranges from politics, economics, and bioinformatics to design, art and music. They use their diverse knowledge to provide unexpected perspectives on the world, through the lenses of science, technology and social theory. Their mission is to foster intelligent, optimistic thinking about the future, and to empower people to contribute to it.

We're joined by their co-founders, Dr Angus Hervey and Tane Hunter.

Angus is a political economist, journalist and media commentator specialising in the impact of disruptive technologies on society. He is the former community manager for Random Hacks of Kindness, the longest running and largest social hackathon in Australia, and the former editor of Global Policy, one of the world's leading international policy journals. He holds a Masters in Political Economy and a PhD in Government from the London School of Economics, where he was also the Ralph Miliband Scholar between 2009 and 2012.

Tane is a science communicator, futurist and bioinformatician. He has worked for the Royal Children's Hospital diagnosing rare genetic diseases in children and is currently completing his PhD at the Peter MacCallum Cancer Centre in Melbourne, using molecular biomarkers and artificial intelligence to better understand, diagnose and improve treatment for people suffering from cancer. He is also a former US mountain biking champion, and an avid sailor, participating in races around the world.

Stay an extra day and learn more about environmental practice in Wellington. With five field trips to choose from, there's something for everyone.

FIELD TRIP 1 | KAPITI EXPRESSWAY - MITIGATING AND MONITORING ENVIRONMENTAL EFFECTS

A tour of the newly opened expressway as an example of the Resource Management Act process in New Zealand.

The newly opened Kapiti Expressway will give you an on the ground look at New Zealand's Resource Management Act in action within the context of a major roading project. Covering all aspects of the resource management process, from initial impact assessment measures to implementation of consent conditions and the monitoring of mitigation success. The impacts considered included ecological, economic, social and cultural issues. This field trip will focus on effective monitoring and measuring throughout each stage of the project (pre-works assessment measures, during works adaptive monitoring and post works success monitoring). It will also focus on the commercial sector involvement for good environmental outcomes through teaming up with a variety of disciplines and community members.

FIELD TRIP 2 | WEAVING INDIGENOUS BIODIVERSITY INTO THE FABRIC OF A CITY

A tour of Wellington's hilltops, south coast and special places, focusing on biodiversity protection and recovery and community engagement.

Where else on earth can you see such a dynamic, evolving, intimate, and creative relationship between citizens and nature? We will visit places where natural processes and indigenous biodiversity share space with development and cultural activity. What does our history in this place teach us about possible futures? How have we adapted to this place and how are humans evolving a creative relationship with the natural world?

The field trip will explore some of the practical implications of the conference themes, explore some of the 'so what?' questions.





FIELD TRIP 3 | BUILT HERITAGE AND RESILIENCE - YOU CAN HAVE BOTH

A tour of heritage and early settlement sites in Wellington City.

As the capital city since 1865, Wellington has a wide range of heritage buildings and early settlement sites – both Maori and Pakeha – some of which are of national significance. At the same time, Wellington is particularly susceptible to earthquakes and sea level rise. Protecting Wellington's heritage buildings and historic sites has required innovative approaches and the adoption of ground-breaking technologies. Both Wellington City Council and Heritage New Zealand have been active in working with heritage architects and other experts as well as property developers to protect Wellington's heritage buildings without compromising their resilience to natural hazards. This field trip will be of interest to members of EIANZ's newly formed Heritage Special Interest Section.

FIELD TRIP 4 | INTEGRATED CATCHMENT AND ESTUARINE MANAGEMENT AT PORIRUA HARBOUR

A scenic tour of key locations round the Porirua Harbour and catchment focusing on aspects challenging restoration of a healthy estuary.

Estuaries are one of the most at risk ecosystems in the world. Porirua Harbour is an interesting mix of the three key threats to such systems: sedimentation, contamination and ecological restoration. An award-winning, multi-disciplinary, multi-agency strategy has been developed by councils in partnership with iwi (tribe) and local community. Here are learning opportunities about community engagement, strategy development, strategy implementation, the essential interface between science and management, urban versus rural, storm water and wastewater, community education, governance issues, local government dynamics and catchment management. All of this in a beautiful hills to sea setting (especially on a good day!) with plenty of opportunity for great photos. The field trip will explore some of the ecological, economic, cultural and social implications of the conference theme.

FIELD TRIP 5 | RESILIENCE AND BEHAVIOUR IN THE REAL WORLD

Come and explore the research that is being done with government, businesses and communities to build resilience to natural hazards and improve the liveability of cities.

The Opus Research team comprises engineers, chemists, physicists, materials scientists, environmental scientists, geographers and behavioural scientists who work with government, businesses and communities to build resilience to natural hazards and improve the liveability of cities.

The conference themes fit nicely with the work they do and in particular large scale research projects that are on the go at the moment.

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




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
