## **ABSTRACT**

## **NSW** biodiversity offsets reform

The NSW government is reforming its world-leading framework for biodiversity offsets and will be continuing engagement with stakeholders. NSW has the strongest biodiversity market in Australia, with demand emerging from transport infrastructure, renewable energy projects and housing. The proposed reforms from the BC Act review and the government's election commitment will address key issues that have emerged. The objectives of these reforms are to improve biodiversity outcomes, support the functioning of the biodiversity credit market, increase transparency and accountability, and reduce unnecessary regulatory burden. This is increasingly important as we make the vital transition to renewable energy in NSW and across Australia. In addition to challenges, there are significant opportunities, including in relation to biodiversity offsets. Co-ordinating this investment is an opportunity to improve conservation outcomes and bring together proponents. This will require working with landholders and local communities, linking in with other government programs, and potentially other markets such as the carbon market and the nature repair market.
